Digital History Project

Required Components:

- 1. A thesis (your contention "argument" on the topic you choose where you make a definitive stand).
- 2. Evidence from legitimate historical sources that backs your thesis statement/ contention on the topic.
- 3. All evidence properly cited in Chicago Manual Style.
- 4. A **minimum** of two pages, 700 words (double spaced, 12 point Arial font) of written text, plus a digital component.
- 5. For Video or Audio projects they must be a minimum of five minutes and a maximum of seven minutes in length.

Digital component definition: Audio/ Video, Audio only, photographic images.

Permissible software examples:

Movie/ audio editors, timeline creators, PowerPoint, Prezi, Photographic editors such as Photoshop or other brand names, website design software, Facebook pages, or other software upon my approval. (Note: You must know how to use these software programs already since class time cannot be utilized for software training.)

Examples of projects:

- 1. Timeline creation using text and photos to create a narrative of a topic proving your thesis statement.
- 2. A video utilizing moving images, audio, photos, and text to create a narrative on a topic proving your thesis statement.
- 3. PowerPoint, Prezi or private Facebook page, utilizing text, photos, and if possible with the software audio and/ or video to create a narrative on a topic proving your thesis statement.
- 4. A website utilizing text, photos, audio, video to create a narrative on a topic proving your thesis statement.
- 5. Other projects need approval.

Permissible Topics for digital projects:

- 1. Causes and Events Leading to World War II
- 2. Causes and Events leading to and encompassing the Second Red Scare in the United States including McCarthyism and Joseph McCarthy's downfall.
- 3. Causes and Events leading to the Vietnam War and the anti-war movement in the mid to late 1960s and early 1970s
- 4. The reemergence of the Civil Rights movement in the 1950s and the zenith in the 1960s





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- 5. The early history of the U.S. Space Program in the late 1950s through the 1960s and its Cold War motivation.
- 6. The early history of television in the 1950s and 60s focusing on race and gender depictions in television programs.
